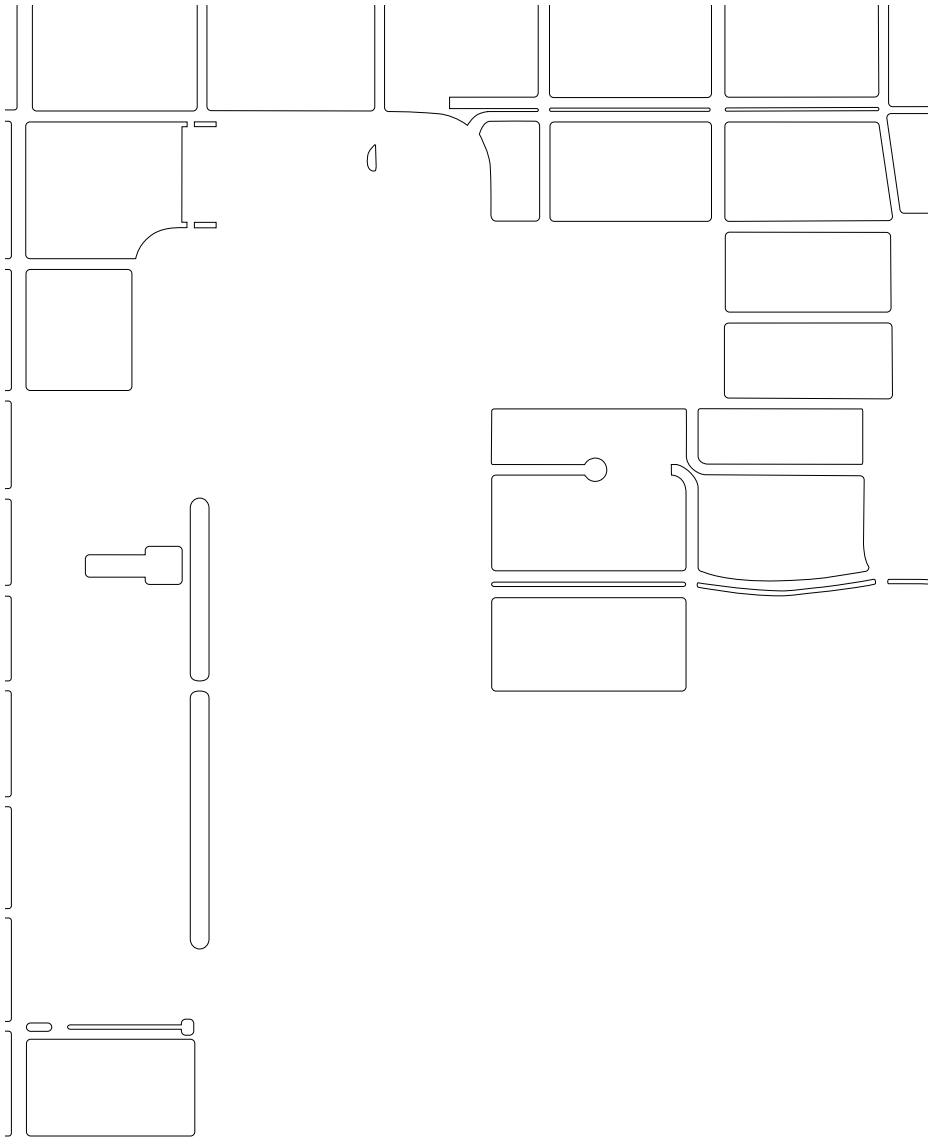

POLICY FOR REPORTING THE ANNUAL DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS

1. The purpose of this policy is to ensure that the annual disclosure of crime statistics is accurate, reliable, and consistent with the requirements of the Crime Statistics Act, 1993 (CSA) and the Crime Statistics Regulations, 1994 (CSR).

2. This policy applies to all members of the police force and all staff of the police force who are involved in the collection, processing, and reporting of crime statistics.

3. The following are the key principles that guide the reporting of crime statistics:

- a. Accuracy: All crime statistics must be reported accurately and in accordance with the definitions and classifications set out in the CSA and CSR.
- b. Reliability: All crime statistics must be based on reliable and verifiable information.
- c. Consistency: All crime statistics must be reported in a consistent manner across all police forces and over time.
- d. Transparency: All crime statistics must be reported in a transparent and accessible manner.
- e. Confidentiality: All crime statistics must be reported in a confidential manner, in accordance with the provisions of the Access to Information Act and the Privacy Act.

4. The following are the key responsibilities of the police force in reporting crime statistics:

- a. To ensure that all crime statistics are reported accurately and in accordance with the requirements of the CSA and CSR.
- b. To ensure that all crime statistics are based on reliable and verifiable information.
- c. To ensure that all crime statistics are reported in a consistent manner across all police forces and over time.
- d. To ensure that all crime statistics are reported in a transparent and accessible manner.
- e. To ensure that all crime statistics are reported in a confidential manner, in accordance with the provisions of the Access to Information Act and the Privacy Act.

5. The following are the key requirements of the CSA and CSR:

- a. All police forces must report crime statistics annually to the Statistics Canada.
- b. All police forces must report crime statistics in accordance with the definitions and classifications set out in the CSA and CSR.
- c. All police forces must report crime statistics in a consistent manner across all police forces and over time.
- d. All police forces must report crime statistics in a transparent and accessible manner.
- e. All police forces must report crime statistics in a confidential manner, in accordance with the provisions of the Access to Information Act and the Privacy Act.

6. The following are the key consequences of non-compliance with the CSA and CSR:

- a. Non-compliance with the CSA and CSR may result in the police force being fined or having its funding reduced.
- b. Non-compliance with the CSA and CSR may result in the police force being named in the annual report of the Statistics Canada.
- c. Non-compliance with the CSA and CSR may result in the police force being named in the annual report of the Access to Information Act and the Privacy Act.
